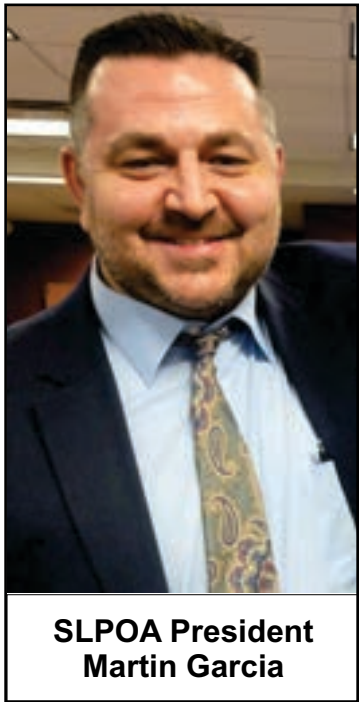

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

STOP GASLIGHTING



The Mayor of the City of St. Louis has said, “It is important that our police officers tell the truth.” Hmmm. The context of the Mayor’s statement was in defense of her actions at a recent police officer’s funeral. The implication, here, is that I was lying and/or the Chief was lying and/or the involved police officers were lying. I was not lying. The Chief was not lying. And the involved police officers were not lying. But someone was. And herein “lies” the intricacy and wickedness of gaslighting, or more specifically being gaslit by someone.

Gaslighting is a sophisticated form of manipulation. In our everyday lives... disagreements, misunderstandings and attempts to influence one another happen in private interactions. What is occurring here is fundamentally different. This is the city’s chief executive officer—her words—using the bully’s pulpit and her considerable access to the media to cajole, name-call and

publicly attempt to renegotiate the terms of a collectively bargained agreement. You know... gaslighting.

For instance, the Mayor has been on quite the press tour the last two weeks. She has been proclaiming the starting salary for SLMPD police officers is \$70,000. The Mayor asserts our “fringe” (her word) benefit package is \$150,000. Now, to be clear both of those numbers are not accurate. As a matter of fact, both of these numbers are lies. There is a word in there that she uses repeatedly, though, as she proclaims her overall goal is to increase salaries, so to increase recruiting. The word the Mayor uses is “fringe.” To recap, the Mayor is publicly stating to tens of thousands of people in this region that the “fringe” benefits City police officers receive is \$150,000.

Why the use of the word “fringe?” The answer to that requires a deeper

understanding of gaslighting. Is the public to assume the Mayor of the City of St. Louis, an ex-officio member of the Board of Police Commissioners, a college-degree-holder, does not know what a “fringe” benefit is? Is the public to assume this was a slight language misstep, made dozens of times? Is the public to assume the taxpayers, visiting and residing in St. Louis, are paying over double a police officer’s salary in “fringe” benefits? Is this a subtle way of covering for the inaccuracy of the numbers? Is she implying that “fringe” benefits can be converted into a salary number?

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MESSAGE FROM THE BUSINESS MANAGER

New Talking Points, Same Old Politics

The latest catchphrase among city politicians opposing the governor-appointed Board of Police Commissioners is “taxation without representation.” The mayor and other progressive Democrats have used it to frame the city’s budget dispute with the board. It has been repeated on social media, raised at community meetings, and echoed by the Post-Dispatch Editorial Board in its recent sharply one-sided account of the dispute between the SLPOA and the mayor. The phrase is catchy and invokes our nation’s founding fight, but the reality is that the police board is far from “taxation without representation.” The elected mayor sits on the board. The elected comptroller, mayor, and president of the Board of Aldermen all have line-item veto power over the budget. The governor who appoints the board is also an elected official. In other words, there are several layers of representation already in place.

What a police board does prevent is the city using the Police Department as a way to redirect department funds toward political pet projects. It prevents the city from defunding the police by sending tens of millions of dollars back to the city each year instead of investing those funds in needed improvements. It also prevents the city from misrepresenting officer benefits and salaries or taking money from the police budget to raise salaries in another city department. That is what this dispute is really about.



It is not about control of the department; it is about control of the police budget. With new oversight on the budget, the days of bait and switch are over. Money earmarked for the department will be used for the department.

Taxation without representation does occur in the city—and it happens every day through the hundreds of millions of dollars collected annually from the earnings tax.

Much of that revenue comes from nonresidents who must pay a percentage of their wages simply because they work within city limits. The tax must be approved by voters every five years to remain in effect, but only city residents get a vote. In other words, a tax imposed on nonresidents and used to fund general revenue is approved by residents and enforced against people who have no say in the matter. That sounds like taxation without representation. Where is the representation for the people required to pay it? I am not arguing for eliminating the Earnings Tax; I understand why it exists and the huge impact it has on the city budget. But it is hypocritical for city politicians to make this argument while taxing people who have no meaningful way to object. The city comes to our organization every five years seeking our financial and physical help to pass the earnings tax. They use the SLPOA when it benefits them, then turn their backs on us once the vote is over.

Mayor Spencer's Slight of Hand

Raise your hand if you would accept \$150,000 a year in salary and benefits. I would—where do I sign? According to Mayor Spencer, that is what you already receive. But that figure includes retiree health insurance, all of the pension liability, workers' compensation, disability, and other department expenses as part of your benefits package. Those costs may certainly be real expenses for the department but counting them as compensation for a newly hired officer is misleading. It creates the false impression that cutting benefit-side funding would automatically increase salaries. In reality, a large portion of that alleged \$150,000 is tied to legally required pension funding and retiree obligations, not discretionary benefits that can simply be converted into wages for current officers. So where does she expect to find the money for these changes? YOUR PENSION!

For those who remember the old state-control days, every city politician pushing for a change to local control insisted it was not about the pension. Well, guess what? It was—and still is—about the pension. Mayor Spencer made that clear during her latest media tour advocating for changes to our benefit structure which, by the way, is highly inappropriate. Promoting a proposal to change benefits for employees in the media while that group is actively represented by a labor union is a clear violation of well-established labor practices. The St. Louis Police Officers' Association is the exclusive bargaining representative for police officers and sergeants. She knows that, yet she continues to push her agenda through the media.

The truth is that our pension is protected by state statute, and she knows she cannot change benefits haphazardly. That is likely the purpose of this media tour: to build public support for changes to our pension and benefit system and use that pressure in Jefferson City. It will not work. The SLPOA has well-established relationships in Jefferson City, and those politicians are well informed on SLMPD benefits. In addition, the Police Retirement System Board will not allow her to raid our pension system. As of this writing, our system is more than 83% funded, with more than one billion dollars in assets for the first time ever. SLPOA could advocate for increases to benefits at this funding level. The system is healthy and it is being managed very well. What a strange coincidence that the mayor is suddenly interested in changing officer benefits. It is most definitely about the pension.

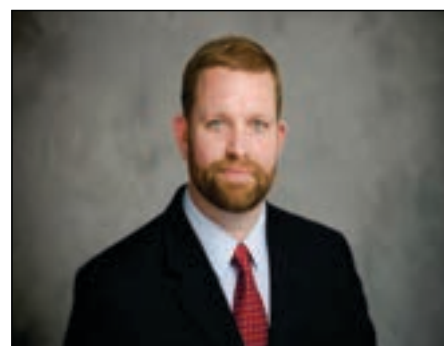

Police Officers Ball Set for October 17th

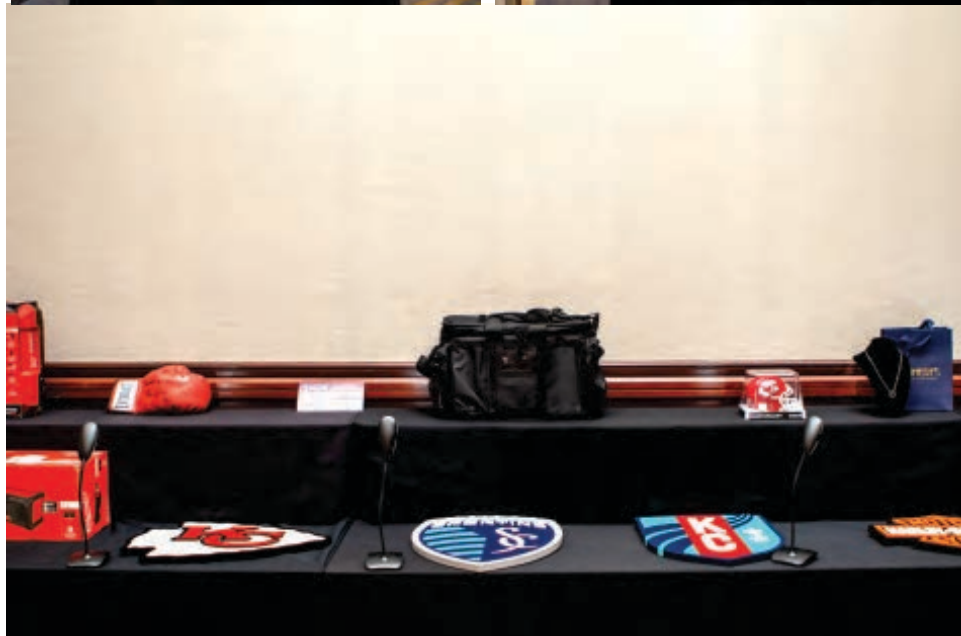

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She Has A Responsibility To Lead

The Post-Dispatch would have St. Louisans believe Mayor Cara Spencer is a powerless bystander when it comes to the Police Department. She isn't.

There is a legally constituted Board of Police Commissioners overseeing the department, and challenges to the state law creating that structure have thus far been rejected by the courts. More importantly, Mayor Spencer herself has a seat on that board.

She has a voice. She has a vote. She has a responsibility to lead.

Instead, the mayor has spent weeks publicly criticizing police compensation, questioning the value of officers' benefits and repeatedly calling pensions, health insurance and other earned compensation "fringe benefits."

There is nothing "fringe" about them.

These are benefits negotiated and agreed upon as part of officers' compensation. They help recruit officers, retain experienced officers and provide security to families whose loved ones perform one of the most difficult and dangerous jobs in our city. The mayor's repeated characterization suggests a troubling misunderstanding of what an employee compensation package actually is.

Mayor Spencer has told the Police Officers' Association that we need to "act like adults." We agree.

Acting like adults means respecting agreements already in place. It means bringing disagreements to the bargaining table instead of litigating them through radio interviews and newspaper headlines. And it means accepting the responsibilities of leadership rather than blaming the governing structure whenever you don't like the outcome.

The mayor is not an observer of the Police Board. She is a member of it.

If Mayor Spencer wants to lead, she should use that seat, cast her votes, make her case and work with the other commissioners.

St. Louis doesn't need another media feud.

It needs leadership.

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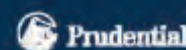
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CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

with and were saluted by Chief Tracy; and posed for pictures as their Dad was presented with his award. It was very moving!

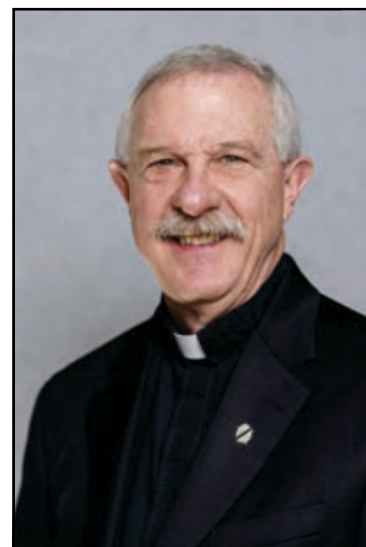
